## **AVOID WEATHER WARS: BECOME A SKYWALKER**

Getting from place to place in the heart of downtown Grand Rapids doesn't need to be a burden when the weather turns inclement. Whether faced with snow, rain or the heat of a West Michigan summer, you can easily get from "point A" to "point B" in the River City without setting foot outside.

The climate-controlled elevated skywalk — officially known as the Grand River Concourse - was constructed in the 1980s. Extending five city blocks, it connects two major downtown hotels with the city's top entertainment venues. Beginning at DeVos Place to the north, the skywalk extends south through the Amway Grand Plaza Hotel and across Pearl Street. It continues through the National City Bank Building and the Campau Square Plaza Building, then across Campau Street to the Courtyard by Marriott. It then crosses Fulton Street and Market Avenue, extending through Arena Station and across Ottawa Avenue before ending at Van Andel Arena.

"We have seen a lot of traffic coming into DeVos Place (through the skywalk). The opening of the skywalk has been a definite plus for the convention goers," said Lynne Ike, marketing director for DeVos Place and Van Andel Arena. "We also have quite a few people entering the Arena for the Griffin's games, Rampage games and concerts."

Skywalk access is available through any of the connecting buildings during event hours, or through an exterior entrance at the corner of Market and Fulton. The section between the Amway Grand and the public access on Market is open all day, every day. Other sections are open based on Arena and DeVos Place events. Access to some hotel areas is by key-card only after 11 p.m. With an abundance of light and security cameras, the skywalk is safe, even well into the night.

There is no smoking in the skywalk, but you will find drinking fountains, a pop machine, trash receptacles and an ATM. A variety of businesses are located on the skywalk level, including the Schnitz Skywalk Deli and the Square Center Styling barbershop. Urban Mill, Subway and Margarita Grill on street level are also accessible via elevators or stairways. The entire concourse is handicap accessible, and color-coded "You Are Here" maps are prominently displayed.
